Clerkship Directors Committee Minutes - December 16, 2016

Meeting called to order at 12:08pm.

- I. Approval of November 18, 2016 minutes. No corrections noted. Motion to approve the minutes, motion approved.
- II. Systemic health integration in Pt. Care- What next?- Dr. Tad Mabry and Ms. Michelle Krupp
 - Clerkships can do a departmental scan to find out if/how/where teaching occurs on systemic health integration in patient care. There is some disconnect with students applying disease conditions/implications to patient care in the D3 year.
 - It was discussed how D3 clerkship directors reinforce this learning process for the students. Suggestions included:
 - i. Using the ADA Handbook as a resource for guidelines that all clerkships (students and faculty) can follow. Guidelines could be distributed to all D3 students so when they encounter a patient with systemic disease, they can refer to the guidelines to help them with the thought process on how to go about treating the patient.
 - ii. Electronically poll the clerkship directors and students using Survey Monkey, or similar, to find the top diseases that affect each clerkship.
 - Once data is collected, have a work group use the ADA handbook to draft guidelines that can be vetted in the committee.
 - iii. Using case presentations reinforce the systemic health integration. Expectations should be the same across the board in all clerkships. Students could be assigned a disease topics and give a 30 minute presentation referencing the guidelines. Faculty should be present to clarify any discrepancies that may come out of the presentation with resourced information.
 - Ms. Michelle Krupp ran a report that outlines which courses in the curriculum address the
 collegiate competency 6.5: Recognize the manifestations of systemic disease and how
 the disease and its management may affect the delivery of dental care. Data was
 reported from each course director. This information identifies where and how the
 competency is taught and assessed and can be used to help us determine gaps and
 curricular threads.

ACTION ITEMS: Office for Education will send out a survey for top 6 diseases to clerkship directors and students.

- III. Student Code of Conduct- Dr. Sherry Timmons SEE ATTACHMENT
 - The Student Code of Conduct is located in the student handbook on the IntraDent. CAPP had a working group that went over all of the information and came up with the new edition. Every fall, Dr. Timmons speaks to the students about the code of conduct. They are not required to sign it, but with them being

- present they acknowledge that they received this information. Focus groups with students, faculty, and staff came up with this code of conduct.
- The code of conduct is reviewed and edited approximately every 1 ½ years. Please notify Dr. Timmons or Dean Solow if there are any revisions needing to be made.

IV. <u>Unified Referral Process-</u> Dr. Lily Garcia

- The Advanced Education Committee, has been discussing the D3-to-Resident specialty referral process. As a result, a unified referral process in Axium is being developed to document the process and help close the loop. Once the Advanced Education Committee receives specific referral information from each specialty, Mr. Jerry Gehling will present the AxiUm form and process to us.
- V. Scheduled course time- "50/10" mins maximum- Dr. Lily Garcia
 - Dr. Garcia stated that the "50/10" minutes maximum policy will be implemented soon. The purpose of the policy is to limit lectures to no longer than 50 minutes and provide breaks for students to absorb and process information. Faculty should make efforts to actively engage students during lectures (suggested every 12-13 minutes) to increase learning and student attention.

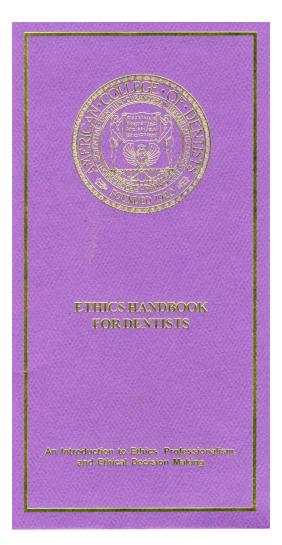

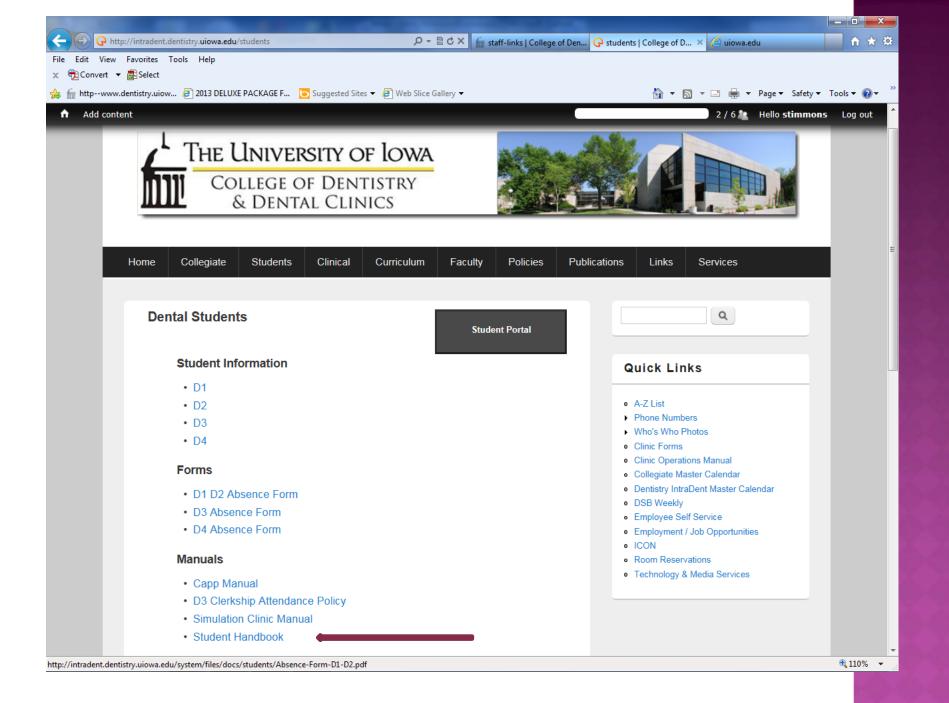
Professional Conduct

With official advisory opinions revised to April 2012.

- The code is a consensus on mutually accepted standards of behavior to facilitate the achievement of our clinical, educational and scientific goals.
- The code relies on the concepts of personal honor, personal and professional responsibility, honesty and integrity
- The professional code is dedicated to patient service and patient well-being as well as your educational experience.

- We have a shared responsibility for promoting and maintaining the highest code of professional ethics within the College, the local community and beyond.
- Students' ethical responsibility to their patients is not limited solely to the application of technical skills, but also includes attention to each patient's unique personal characteristics.

• The revised code is based on the ADA Principles of Ethics and Code of Professional Conduct, the Ethics Handbook For Dentists from the American College of Dentists and standards set forth at the University of Iowa Code of Student Life

COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY AND DENTAL CLINICS

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Attesting to receipt of the Code of Conduct	
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- 1. Performing all educational experiences (classroom, clinical, laboratory) with integrity, fairness and honesty.
- 2. Interacting with all faculty, staff and students in a professional manner.
- 3. Demonstrating attitudes and characteristics that are receptive to feedback in the classroom, laboratory and clinical settings.

- 4. Respecting a patient's right to make their own oral care health decisions. Your responsibility to adequately and honestly inform patients of their oral health needs and treatment options.
- 5. Treating your patients with dignity, compassion and understanding, with fairness and justice in a manner free of prejudice.
- 6.Ensuring that patient record and health care confidentiality is maintained at all times and to follow state and federal regulations, e.g. Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) regulations.

- 7. Conducting yourself in a professional manner with high ethical standards during community service activities, extramural rotation experiences, and meetings of professional organizations.
- 8. Guidelines for what is deemed to be inappropriate relationships with faculty, instructors and staff.

- 9. Behaving in a professional manner within the College of Dentistry and Dental Clinics as well as within the community.
- 10. Abiding by professional and societal expectations regarding the use of both legal and illegal substances.

- 11. Demonstrate respect for others and their property. Prohibiting any physical or verbal behavior whether in person or on electronic (e.g. social media) that is threatening, harassing or demeaning to others.
- 12. Following the collegiate guidelines with respect to attire and physical hygiene.

• Violations of the standards and behaviors outlined in this Code of Conduct will be referred to the Collegiate Academic and Professional Performance (CAPP) Committee for review. The CAPP Committee will recommend actions as outlined in the Collegiate Academic and Professional Performance Committee Procedure Manual.
